#### **RE-VALUING OF AMERICA**

The Reading-Discussion Group met for their final session on Monday, April 24. Bennett's chapter on separation of church and state was discussed along with culminating ideas on "re-valuing America."

Bennett does a good job of identifying the problems associated with the loss of values in the United States. He has included a number of good suggestions for revaluing American lives. I have summarized some of these ideas coming from the discussion as well as additional thoughts for your consideration:

- 1. There is a need for distinguishing between separating government from a state church and the impossibility of separating the people and their government from essential religious and spiritual beliefs and practices. Valuable character traits come from within and cannot be separated from the individual.
- 2. Prayer is an appropriate part of school life. We need to emphasize the fact that prayer is not illegal and encourage school officials to exercise their responsibilities to educate without omitting essential elements of the process.
- 3. We have a tendency to operate with a mind set that often errs. We should be open to all truth and not accept any idea unless it is based on sound principles. To obtain the mind of Christ is our ultimate goal.
- 4. We should constantly guard against the acceptance of bad means to serve good ends. It is easy to substitute legalism for sound principles. The far right may be using unsatisfactory means to reach toward positive goals.
