## $W_{\text {hat }}$ Hurts?

In 1992, Trevecca's Allied Health Department remains a reputable and competive asset to the college and is proudly recognized nationwide as a quality avenue to profitable career in medicine. The department specializes in various health programs one of which includes the Physicians Assistant (PA) program.

Dr. Gary C. Johnson heads the program and has served as its director since 1983 and is delighted with what the PA program stands for and has to offer. Serving with Dr. Johnson is Dr. Mike Mordock as the medical direc. tor consultant.

The Physician's Assistant program gives interested students an education based in the medical setting, training them as an extension of the physician in any field of medicine. A common misunderstanding centers around the word "assistant." They assist in surgery as well as in the deliveries of babies. They are entitled to prescribe medicaton and work as an essential link between the doctor and the patient.

There is a growing need for PA personnel. As a matter of fact, a 2 year
bachelor's degree as a PA affords the graduate of $100 \%$ chance of getting a job anywhere in the United States. Starting pay anywhere in the country is approximately $\$ 35,000$.
Obtaining a PA degree at TNC is something to be proud of. Within the U.S. there exists 51 other PA programs and Trevecca is above the mean in performance on the national boards and is accredited by the American Medical Association. Trevecca's PA program carries quite a reputation other national programs as is evident by the background of those currently enrolled. The average class size ranges from 25 to 30 students and will double next semester according to applica. tions received.

The curriculum design is focused around a solid foundation based on science and human biology as each new semester builds on the previous one.

One aspect that sets TNC's PA program apart from the rest takes shape when noticing how the staff and faculty view their students. There is a great dedication as the PA program personnel maintain an on-going asso-
ciation with the students after gradua tion. The program also has a uniqui orientation with a Christian emphasi which makes a considerable differenc in all areas concerned and is noted a being contributing factor in Trevecc having one of the best Physicians As sistant programs in America.

One final aspect about the progran that needs stressed concerns how i takes a total program effort workin; with students to educate with the bes interest of the students' in mind tit produce the best results. The TNC $\mathrm{P}_{r}$ program operates from this perspec tive and is never satisfied with excel lence. That's why they are always in volved in an on-going self-study. Th means that the program is alway working and probeing on how to pos sibly be of even better quality and $t$ see if students are really adherent an truly satisfied. Five freshmen, one transfer, four returning players, two new assistant coaches, and a new head coach What does it all add up to? A true learning experience.

This year was definitely a building year for the Trojans because a majority of the players were young. "Because we had a young team, we lacked experience. We only had two players from last year on the court the whole time," junior Lorri Forman, who made All-Conference and All-Tournament, said.

But, as the season progressed, the young Trojans gained experience and started working as a team. "At first, everything was new - new girls and a new coach. After we got started, we began to win games and work well together," Laura McReynolds, a junior transfer who played volleyball for Trevecca in 1985, said.

Although the ladies finished 10 23 , the experience gained this year will definitely help the program in the future. Sandy Donnelly, finish. ing her fourth season at Trevecca, believes that the program is im. proving. "It seems the program as a whole is getting better, even though our records don't show it," she said.

In addition to gaining experience, the Trojan team also formed lasting friendships. "We formed good, lasting relationships with teammates," Lorri, who was a utility player this year, said.

Part of the reason that the season was enjoyable was the new leadership of Head Coach Lyn Slonecker. Slonecker, coming to Trevecca with four years of coaching experience, contributed significantly to the team through her "youthfulness and vitality," sopho. more Shonnie Rhodes, who made All-Conference and TCAC Scholar.

Another exciting part of the season was the overwhelming support of the student body. "Each year support has increased. It's incredible to walk out on the court and see all of the fans," Sandy, who made All-Conference, said," she said.

Since this year was a time to gain experience, the outlook for next season is very good. "I'm anticipating a good recruiting year and that the team will take some of this experience and let it work next year," Slonecker added.

With only two underclassmen and one senior returning, the Trojans had a tough season, finishing $13-20$ overall. Because they had so many new players, it was hard for the team to work together. "Only two players on the team had ever played together," Greg Scharf, a junior, said of himself and senior David Suddeth. And although the freshmen and the transfers had talent, it was difficult for them to work together. "Most of us worked really hard. We had good talent, but we couldn't seem to put it all togeth er," sophomore Jason Pennington re marked.

Despite the lack of experience and the loss of several key starters in some of the games, the Trojans finished 8.7 in the conference. Although they missed their goal of beating arch-rival David Lipscomb, they won the Athens State Tournament in November. "We played really well at Athens State and beat some really good teams," junior Hank Hare said.

Senior David Suddeth, named Most Valuable Player at the Athens State Tournament, had a record-breaking year. He holds twenty-two Trevecca records, including most points in a career, 3,004. David has averaged 22.9 points per game and has been selected to each All-Tournament team in every tournament the Trojans have played in for the past four years. He was also named Second Team All-American his junior year and Honorable Mention All-American in both his sophomore and senior seasons.

David says this year in particular has taught him that it is really not all about winning. "Getting along is the most important thing. This year we really learned to get along." And since the Trojans were able to gain experience, both on and off the court, along with some good recruiting, next year promises to be a better year. ## In Tennis, It Was A Year For



Despite the news in January that there would not be a tennis program at Trevecca next year, the women's and men's teams had very successful seasons. The women had the best record in six years, and the men's team once again won the district and went to nationals.

The women's team, the first full team since 1987, finished 12-13 overall and $10-8$ in the conference. Coach Alan Smith, whose only coaching experience with the women's team was in 1973, pointed out that they accomplished their goals. Assistant Coach Jeff Boyett, who took the women's team on road trips, commented, "Our goal was to finish in the top five in the district and we finished fourth, so I'll say our season was a great success. This years' team was dedicated to the program and were of a different caliber than any of the women's teams of the past." Junior Demeka Chance agrees. "For the first time, we had team unity and we all got along great, probably due to the new coach."

Along with improving relationships and team records, this year's team had very significant academic accomplish. ments. All six members made the Academic All-Conference Team and three players, juniors Dee Howell, Stacie Nichols, and Kim Tinker, were nominated for Academic All-American.

Knowing that the 1991-1992 season would be the last for the program, the women worked hard and did their best for their coaches and for themselves. The men's team also tried hard to do well since it was the last year. And do well they did. "We tried to do our best for Coach Smith," freshman Roger Merz, who will return to Switzerland to play next year, said. The men finished their season with an impressive $14-0$ district record and 20 2 overall. They also clinched to district title, taking 34 of the maximum 36 points, and once again earned a well deserved trip to the national tournament. Three of the six players and one of the doubles teams received NAIA national rankings. Freshman Juan Carlos Bianchi, who has been nominated

Smith, who achieved his 300th career victory as a coach this year, pointed out that the news made the season very different. "It was an emotionally draining year for me because I knew it was the last. There was no loyalty built among the guys because they had to begin looking for another school in mid-January."

Regardless of the shocking news, the men agree that this season was great and exciting. Freshman Mucha Murapa said," Although we're losing the program, we kept smiling and had a lot of fun." Adam Lane, the only American on a team whose other members originate from Argentina, Venezuela, England, Sweden, and Switzerland, said that this season was very special to him. "I got to meet and know some the best players from all over the world." Juan Garat, an AllAmerican in doubles in 1990, believes this team was more united than those of the past. "We all respected each other. If we had a problem, we tried to solve as a team."

Both teams would attribute much of their success to the man who has been at the helm of Trevecca tennis for twenty years. To many people, Coach Alan Smith has been a coach, a leader, and a friend. Junior Dee Howell points out, "He is not only my coach but also my friend. Despite what we've done to hurt him, he's been loyal to both the team and the school." Junior Stacie Nichols, who is from Oregon, agrees. She said, "Coming from across the country, he's not only been a coach but a father figure to me. Since I've been here I've gained a lot of respect for him. He's a great example, especially in his walk with Christ." Coach Smith, looking back on his career at Trevecca, reflected on his years of coaching: The 1991-1992 Tennis program was once again one of strength, integrity, and winning.
