

District Budgets

In asking for Life Savers we are not imposing an extra burden upon our people. **EVERY DOLLAR COLLECTED THROUGH LIFE SAVERS WILL GO TO THE CREDIT OF THE CHURCH PAYING ON ITS DISTRICT BUDGET.** Many pastors have expressed appreciation for this method. They have felt that it will be a great help to them in bringing up their district budget. At the end of each month we will send a receipt to the District Treasurer for the amount collected from each church on that district, and he will credit the amount paid to your church. In the case of the North Dakota district, pledges are to be sent directly to Rev. Bertrand Peterson, the District Treasurer. On the other districts the college receives the money directly and receipts the individuals paying and later sends a receipt of totals to the District Treasurer.
