

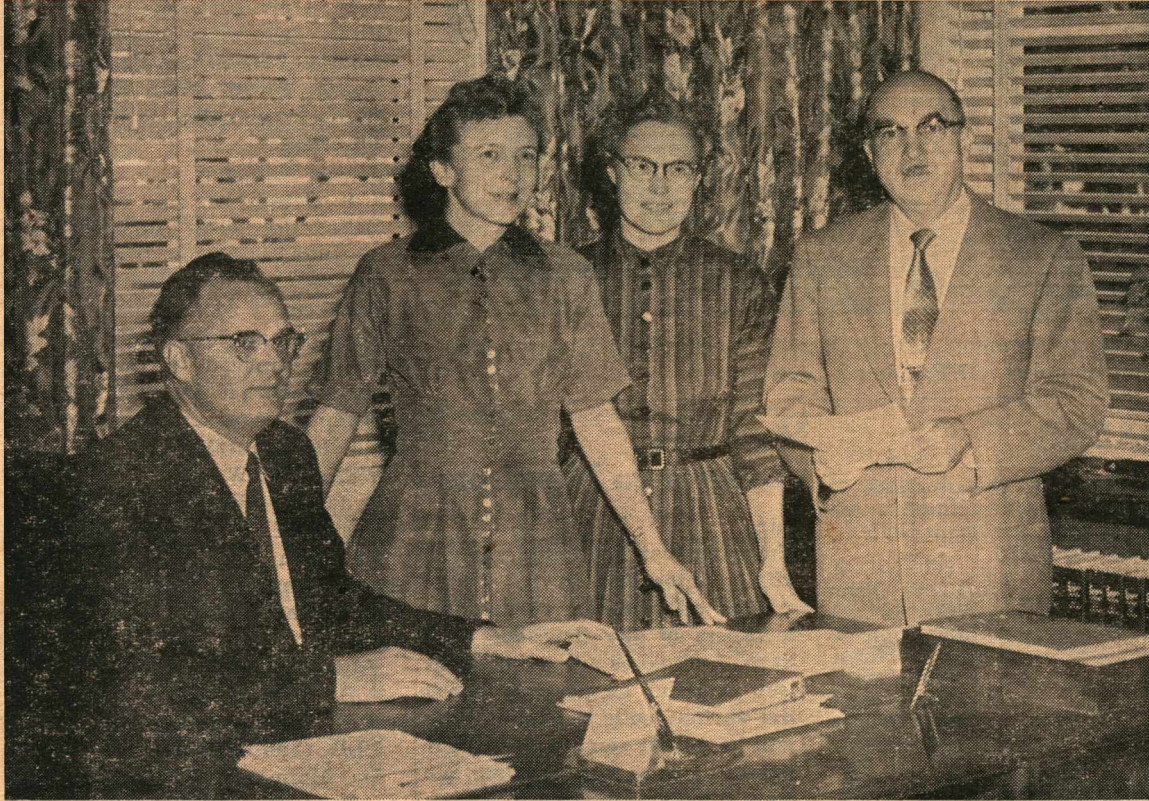

Eight Schools Send Representatives

Presidents, deans, business managers and field representatives from seven colleges and the Nazarene Theological Seminary will be on our campus during the next few days for the Fifth Educational Conference sponsored by the department of education of the Church of the Nazarene. The group is meeting for two and a half days beginning Wednesday, October 5.

Dr. Riley said that General Superintendent Hardy C. Powers and Dr. S. T. Ludwig, executive secretary of the Department of Education of the Church of the Nazarene, will attend the conference and speak to the members.

Two public sessions are to be held. The first of these will be a chapel service Wednesday morning with President A. B. Mackey of Trevecca Nazarene College, Nashville, Tennessee, as speaker. On Wednesday evening Dr. Ludwig will speak in the regular mid-week service at College Church. Other sessions will be closed and will feature study and discussion of mutual problems.

Among other activities planned for the visitors are a luncheon with N.N.C. students, breakfast with the faculty, and a visit to Shore Lodge at McCall. Here they will enjoy a Western barbecue and hear an address by Dr. Powers.

Dr. Riley said that the following colleges will be represented at the conference: Eastern Nazarene College, Wollaston, Mass.; Olivet Nazarene College, Kankakee, Ill.; Bethany College, Bethany, Okla.; Pasadena College, Pasadena, Cal.; Canadian Nazarene College, Red Deer, Alberta; Trevecca Nazarene College, Nashville, Tennessee; and the Nazarene Theological Seminary in Kansas City, Mo.

NNC is also included in the conference.

Should a College Be Christian

Bruyere, the French essayist, once wrote, "It is very rare to find ground which produces nothing.—If it is not covered with flowers, fruit trees, and grains, it produces briars and pines.—It is the same with man; if he is not virtuous, he becomes vicious."

Cultivation makes the difference in what the ground produces; education makes the difference in the man. But it is not the amount of cultivation that makes all the difference. It is the kind that really counts. Man needs the proper kind, more than amount, of education to be at his best. And certainly the only proper kind of education is a Christian education. Or is it?

As a freshman I worried over this. It's impractical, I thought, to attempt college work with camp meeting spirit.

Since then I've changed my mind, due perhaps to three reasons. First is the opportunity we have here for a scholastic study of the Bible. Second is the influence of Christian teachers' treatment of the subject matter. Third, and most important to me I believe, is association with other young people who, by their living, prove Christianity works.

Man is at his best when he is an educated Christian. Producing such is the goal of Christian colleges like NNC. So, considering this I find a Christian college education invaluable.

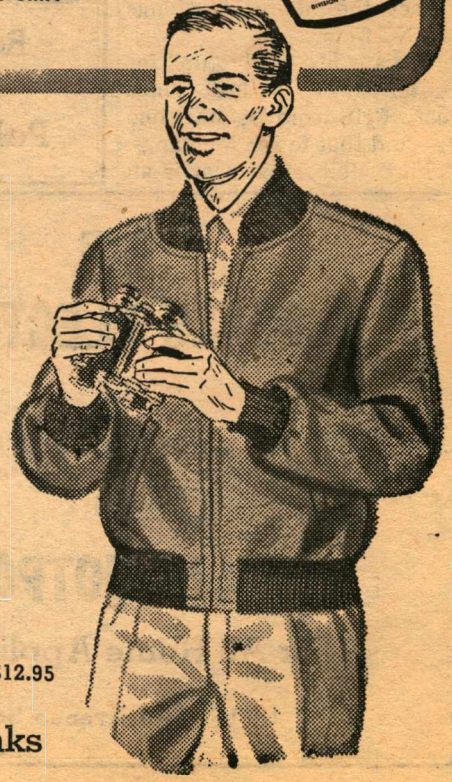
