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College High as a Part Of NNC's Associated Student Body

The article on College High School, in last week's Crusader, brought into the open several important points.

First of all, if this were a very harmonious arrangement we would not now have the problem that confronts us. By their own admission, they are our "Little Brothers," so, let me make this analogy. Since when has the little brother helped select the big brothers' wife?

Next, all the group activities are planned with the high school students in view, but really now, do they participate fully?

CHS very seldom participates in our student body activities on

Wednesday chapel because they are having their own, as they should. On Monday for the most part they are not involved in our organization days. They remain in their own building for meetings.

The entire truth has not been told about the Oasis. Taking your own figure of \$675 let us determine what you get in return. Each annual costs about \$9.00. You pay and get back over \$800. As far as getting only 14 pages, please remember that you get 184 pages in your annual, the same as everyone else, with 14 pages devoted exclusively to your group. No other group has such exclusiveness. Just as concerns the Oasis, you receive much more than the \$10 that you pay in each semester. The \$10 is not a poll tax but rather benefits you receive from football games, basketball games, baseball and track, as well as plays, Crusader, Oasis, and many other privileges you already know — intramural, etc.

College High School will still play the preliminary in one-half of the college games and the JVs will play the remaining preliminaries. They will still remain at the games and be a main cog in the cheering sections. However, we would want some figures before we said the High School usually

had a greater percent present than the college.

Where have we picked up this idea of separation!! It's silly, no one wants it and no one asked for it. We are merely asking each vote to be in its proper area of classification.

It might interest the writer of the previous article that the friction did not arise alone over an election in a recent year but this friction has been associated on this campus for the past eight or ten years. Freshman basketball was started at NNC this week with 15 first year men turning out for the initial practice sessions.

Coach Orrin Hills worked his boys mostly on fundamentals in the first sessions with emphasis on passing, dribbling and basic play patterns.

It appears that speed and not height will be the strong point in this year's freshman squad. Only four of the players out so far stand over six feet.

However several of the players are promising on the basis of their past experience. Some of these are Sam Willard 6-2 forward who was all-state from North Dakota last year; George Zickefoose, 6-0 forward who has three years' high school varsity experience; Wally Steward, 5-10 guard who also has three years' varsity experience in high school, and Norman Blair, 6-4 transfer student from Boise Junior College who has four years basketball experience.

Other victims of the Trojan attack this season were Caldwell Sophs, Melba, the Nampa Sophs and Greenleaf Academy by forfeit.

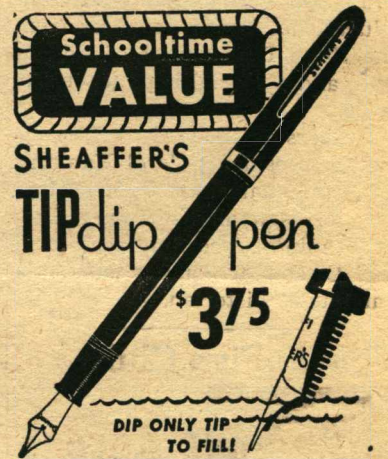
Richardson, Wilcox Take Tennis, Badminton Crowns
