

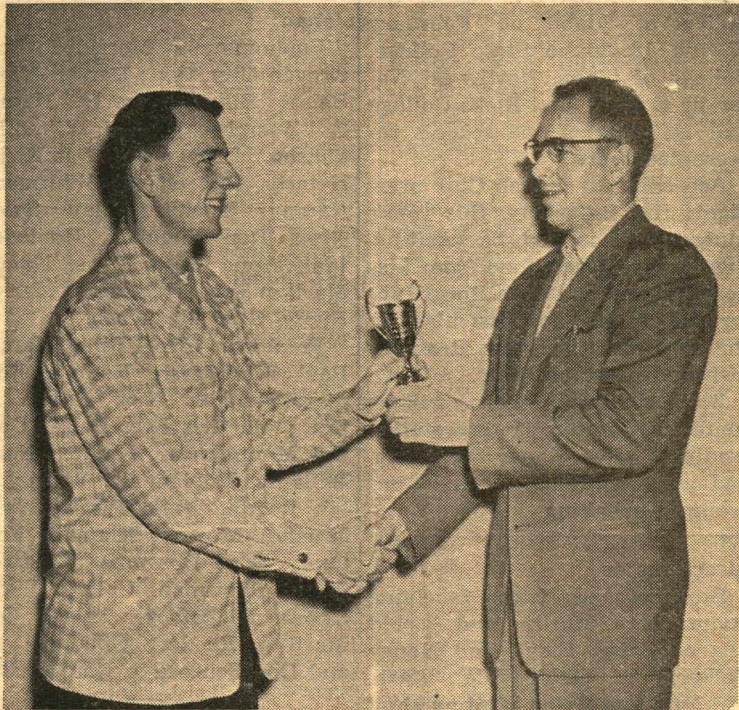

Sixty-Six Named On Honor Roll

Sixty-six Northwest Nazarene College students were named in the Honors Report for first semester as it was issued by Dean Thelma B. Culver Tuesday. The list included 21 students from Nampa.

Dr. Culver announced the honors list during the regular faculty chapel hour on Tuesday.

Leading the classes in honors were the seniors with a total of 20 in a class of 70 named on the list. This gave them a percentage of 28.5. The juniors followed with 17 out of a class of 68 to give them 25 percent. 12 sophomores in a class of 112 ranked them at 10.7 percent while the freshmen with a total of 13 in a class of 177 came up with 7.3 percent.

Dean Culver revealed that 14 students received grade points of 4.00 or straight A averages for first semester. These were:

Maurice Wilk to Give Violin Recital

Maurice Wilk, versatile young American concert violinist, will appear here Feb. 25 in NNC auditorium under the auspices of the Nampa Civic Music Association.

Maurice Wilk is one of the few concert virtuosi, admittedly a master of the classical repertoire, to whom young composers also turn for understanding and appreciation. Mr. Wilk has featured many works of young American composers in his recitals abroad, and has been invited back for three summers to the Composers Conference at Middlebury College, Vermont, where he has regularly performed new works for very critical listeners — the composers themselves.

Mr. Wilk is a native of New York City, where he attended the High School of Music and Art, studied violin under Irma Zacharias, and has taught at Columbia University. During his term of
