# **Bacterial Meningitis**

Colleges nationwide prepare for battle

Over the past two years, Bacterial Meningitis has killed close to 125 college students in the United States alone, with more being put at risk each year. However, the more frightening reality is how it kills, rather than who it strikes.

Bacterial Meningitis, commonly known as Spinal Meningitis or simply Meningitis, is a serious medical condition that infects the fluids of the spinal cord and tissues surrounding the brain. It can cause a myriad of diseases that can result in brain damage or, in some cases, death. In fact, one out of every five cases proves fatal. Even so, Bacterial Meningitis responds well to antibiotics and can be blocked by a new vaccine.

The bacteria responsible for the disease is spread by close contact with infected discharges from the nose or

throat. Common forms of transmission include coughing, sneezing, sharing drinks and kissing. The contagious nature of meningitis is the main reason it is such a growing problem on college campuses.

The close living quarters assigned to on-campus students, along with sheer numbers of bodies, make for an ideal environment for bacteria to thrive and spread.

"Freshman students living on campus are at the highest risk of contracting Meningitis," Cheri Marshall, Northwest Nazarene University's nurse,

One of the most frightening aspects of the disease are the ordinary symptoms that are very similar to the common flu. Symptoms include high fever, headache, stiff neck, nausea, vomiting, sensitivity to light, general confusion and sleepiness. Advanced stages of Bacterial Meningitis is easily recognized by deep bruises that develop under the skin and spread quickly across the body. The infection is most likely to be contracted during the late winter or early spring months, which are also active flu months, though it has been reported in all months of the year.

Questions are being raised as to the preventive actions that are being launched by NNU against this disease. At this point there have been no cases of Bacterial Meningitis reported at NNU and Nurse

## Patriotism sweeps U.S.A. one penny at a time

Residents of the greater Boisearea did more then fly flags last week, however; thousands showed up at the Veterans of Foreign Wars (VFW) post in Boise to contribute to Pennies for Patriotism.

Pennies for Patriotism, a fund-raiser to supplement the American Red Cross' depleted resources, was an idea conceived by a KIZN 92.3 FM listener who called the radio station with an idea for

a community activity. The radio station then adopted the idea and ran with it, with a day-long crusade to collect coins, bills or checks for the American Red Cross. The event, which took place Thursday, September 13, raised around \$50,000.

KIZN was loaned a brand new cement truck in which to collect all loose coins, the main thrust of the campaign. Evening DJ Justin Pierce, just one of the many who helped man the event, commented on the impact this event had on him.

"It was just great to see people from age four giving two or three dollars in pennies to old men from the VFW post," Pierce said. "In fact, one older gentleman wrote us a check for \$600. It was incredible."





### **Blood Drawing to come November 7th**



use of vaccines and prompt
treatment.

The main conflict Nurse Marshall foresees is the monetary cost of the vaccine, which currently ranges from \$90-\$100. Even though the shot is strongly recommended by the American College Heath Association, little financial aid has surfaced to help students foot the bill. While Nurse Marshall battles to lower the cost, possibly down to \$75-\$80, some students view it as a small price to pay for

health security.



### Brandon Hill returns to school

Brandon Hill said "it is good to be back with the guys" when asked how he was feeling after returning to the campus of Northwest Nazarene University. Hill was severely burned in an accident on Friday evening, August 24. He was taken by ambulance to St. Alphonsus Regional Medical Center and later life-flighted to the Burn Center at the University of Utah. He returned to his dorm room to a "welcome back" party on Saturday, September 15.

The campus received e-mails forwarded from someone in Utah asking for notes of encouragement to be sent to aid Hill in his recovery. The crosscountry team also spent time in prayer for him. Hill said he got about 64 e-mails the first day.

Brandon Hill wanted to "Thank everyone for praying for me." It meant a lot to him to know that there were people back in Idaho who cared enough to write and pray. The support was incredible.

Hill expressed his desire to return to campus very clearly, "I just wanted to get out, get back to school and the guys." And the guys, and girls, were apparently happy to see him again too. "Everyone acts like they're really glad to see me."

One downside to his return is readjusting to his classes all over again. He was forced to drop two classes in order to remain caught up in his other classes. He was also worried about how the accident would affect his involvement in track.

However, the beginning of the season is such a long time from now that he feels he should be recovered in time to partici-

For someone who had never spent significant time in the hospital, many things posed interesting problems to overcome. Hill said "One of the weirdest things was the suppository and catheter."

One of the best parts of being at a university hospital was "meeting the young nurses," according to Hill. Apparently, encouragement from the campus was not the only encouragement he received.

Brandon Hill is still undergoing treatment with a therapist once a week in Boise and doing stretching exercises daily.

# Campus counselers ready to drop everything to talk to students

Sue Bankston, working diligently in her chained-off office lobby is a familiar sight to many late evening visitors to the Student Center. Mrs. Bankston is the secretary for the Counseling Department, Multi-cultural Affairs, and the Heath Center at Northwest Nazarene University, all of which are under the umbrella of Student Development.

The department is comprised of one full-time, two part-time, professional counselors: Joanne Rittmueller, JoAnne Nearman and Shawn Jensen all have obtained their Master's degrees.

Many students, especially incoming freshman or transfer students, may not realize the purpose or services offered by NNU's counseling staff. Shawn Jensen, one of two new additions to the department, shared a few thoughts regarding the office's intent:

"We are here to help. You do not have to be mentally ill, mentally unstable, or mentally anything," said Jensen. "We just want you to come in and talk."

The Counseling Department has been established to serve many student-oriented tasks. Providing personal counseling to individuals, couples and small groups is considered to be of utmost importance to the staff. Also, the counselors present co-curricular seminars on developmental issues, as well as developing materials appropriate to school functions.

However, despite these obligations, counselors are more than willing to drop everything to talk to students who need them. They encourage students to come by to talk about anything that concerns them.

"It can be about any issue, or any problem," Jensen affirmed. "If something is getting in the way of a student's life, that's what we're here for."

The biggest concern facing any counseling practice is that of client/counselor confidentiality. NNU's Counseling Department is very aware of this and places the highest priority on professional handling of sensitive material and information as possible. In fact, information about a student that is obtained during a counseling session will not be revealed to

anyone outside of the Counseling Center without that student's consent, unless a disclosure is required by law. A disclosure is required when there is reasonable suspicion of abuse to children, spouse or elderly persons; the client presents a serious danger to his or herself or others; or there are certain court of license board pro-

# NNU recieves new ranking

# Northwest Nazarene University ranked among top 50% of institutions

The following is a press release that was distributed to media in regards to Northwest Nazarene University's ranking this year in U.S. News & World Report's Best Colleges issue which hit newsstands last week.

In its first year in a new classification on the U.S. News & World Report annual ranking of colleges and universities, Northwest Nazarene University made the cut among the top 50 percent of the institutions in the Universities-Master's category.

Northwest Nazarene debuted in this much larger category on the Tier 2 list of top Western universities. NNU had been consistently ranked in the top 10 Western regional liberal arts colleges up until this year when it was reclassified by the Carnegie Foundation as a Master's (Comprehensive) College or University II. U.S. News & World Report uses the Carnegie classifications to determine its ranking categories.

country's universities in the West, which validates our efforts in becoming a comprehensive university that serves Idaho and the greater region as well," said Rich Hagood, president of Northwest Nazarene.

The Universities-Master's category is defined as schools that provide a full range of undergraduate programs and some master's level programs. 573 schools are ranked within this category; 128 of which are from the West.

"As a newcomer to this particular classification we're gratified that we had a strong presence this first time out," said Hagood. "It places us among a set of peer institutions that we watch and identify with. It also places us among institutions with which we have an affiliation athletically within the Great Northwest Athletic Conference."

To see Northwest Nazarene's full ranking, go to the usnews.com website under the Best Colleges report. The rankings are also in the Sept. 17 issue of the magazine's Best Colleges Report.

Northwest Nazarene University is a Christian comprehensive university that offers 44 undergraduate majors and master's programs in seven disciplines. In addition to its 85-acre campus in Nampa, Idaho, the university also has cooperative programs in 10 countries. Founded in 1913, the university serves approximately 1,500 undergraduate and graduate students, and 4,500 continuing education students.


# Students speak out on community reaction to terrorist attacks

"I think that all classes should have been canceled on Tuesday. I also think that the athletic events should have been canceled."




Many changes have occurred just in the baseball world in response to the disaster at hand and here are some examples.

# Rescue attempts turn to mourning in New York

What hope does the world have but Hope itself?

The world stopped. No one breathed. Silent eyes were watching New York City. A nightmare from Independence Day was happening in the United States. Life suddenly changed. America began to turn

## Bush ordered attack on planes

This past Tuesday morning, a couple of airliners were hijacked and smashed into the World Trade Center. A third airliner slammed into the Pentagon. The number of unaccounted for or dead people are more than 5,000.

In a news conference, Mayor Rudolph Giuliani from New York City stated that

5,097 people were missing and that 180 people were dead after the World Trade Center was attacked.

A fourth airliner was also hijacked, and it wrecked in Pennsylvania pre-

ceding the efforts of passengers aboard to make the hijackers stop, as reported from messages on cell phones.

Mr. Cheney presumed that as the White House is not conspicuous in the air, "the target was the Capitol." He believed that "some real heroism by Americans" on the plane was what averted the airliner from crashing into Washington's Capitol. "What they did was to foil the attack on Washington," the Vice President said.

After President Bush heard that an aircraft which was unidentified was heading toward the capital, he ordered U.S

military pilots to "shoot down terrorist attacks in Washingany commercial aircraft that ignored warnings to stay away from Washington," as reported by Vice President Dick

Mr. Cheney did not know as to whether more terrorists were posing a silent threat to America=s safety. The possibility of other terrorists out there definitely exists. "There may well be other operations that have been planned and are, in fact, in the works," the Vice President said.

He said he is convinced that the Saudi millionaire, Osama bin Laden, was supporting the

ton and New York City.

"I have no doubt that he and his organization played a significant role in this," Cheney claimed. "What we are going to do is to aggressively go after Mr. bin Laden, obviously, and all his associates," he said, "and even if it takes a long time, I'm convinced eventually we'll prevail."

Mr. bin Laden is believed to be currently living under the

> protection of the Taliban in Afghanistan. He has been connected to the past bombings of the U.S. embassies in Tanzania and Kenya, which

caused the Clinton administration to strike back with a missile attack on his suspected training bases for terrorists and headquarters in Afghanistan.

President Bush has called for a war to be waged on terrorism. The network of Osama bin Laden will be targeted first. Defense Secretary Rumsfield said the battle should be taken farther than simply the terrorists. The countries around the world that have been financing, tolerating, facilitating and aiding the terrorist activities should also be included he maintained.

### Poll says Americans back military action

In response to last Tuesday's tragic and cowardly act of terrorism, the New York Times and CBS News took a poll of the American people that shows that a greater percentage of the population is in favor of the United States going to war in reaction to and retaliation against the persons responsible. The results are not forgetting that many civilian lives may be lost in the course of any actions during the potential war, but apparently, most Americans are willing to make the sacrifice. of innocent lives for the "greater

During this whole fiasco, President Bush's popularity is the high-

est it's ever been. Much like in similar circumstances of his predecessors, during times of crisis, America as a whole, Democrats, Republicans and Independents alike are rallying around our leadership. His approval rating is now at 84% as opposed to approximately 50% just over a month

Americans now say that they would be willing to give up part of their civil liberties in order to maintain higher security levels to ensure that something of this magnitude never happens again.

The surge in President Bush's popularity is no surprise. His 11 predecessors enjoyed sharp increases in support during crises. After the bombing of Pearl Harbor in 1941, President Franklin

D. Roosevelt's ratings skyrocketed. He was the earliest president about whom such surveys were taken. John F. Kennedy won great public support during the Cuban missile crisis in 1962, as did Jimmy Carter when hostages were seized in Iran in 1979 and Mr. Bush's father, George Bush, in the Persian Gulf war in

Eighty-five percent said the United States should take military action against whoever is responsible for the attacks. 75% of those people said the action should be mounted even if innocent people were killed. Almost all surveyed favored going to war with any nation that harbored the individuals responsible for the attacks.

### President wants bin Laden "dead or alive"

President Bush talked of both war and peace Monday, September 17, 2001, saying he wanted the suspected terrorist Osama bin Laden "dead or alive," but urging Americans that Arabs and Muslims citizens of the United States are patriotic as well.

Mr. Bush singled out Mr. bin Laden in a visit to the Pentagon, where he was briefed by Defense Secretary Donald H. Rumsfeld on the call-up of about 35,000 military reservists in the aftermath of last week's terrorist attacks.

"The focus right now is on Osama bin Laden, no question about it," Mr. Bush said. "He's the prime suspect, and his organization. But there are other terrorists in the world. There are people who hate freedom. This is a fight for freedom. This is a fight to say to the freedom-loving people of the world we will not allow ourselves to be terrorized by somebody who thinks they can hit and hide in some cave somewhere."

Mr. Bush urged his countrymen to prepare for a long war and a different kind of war in the aftermath of the attacks on the World Trade Center and the Pentagon. "It's going to require a new thought process," he said. "The American people are going to have to be more patient than ever with the efforts of our combined efforts - not just ourselves, but the efforts of our allies - to get them running and to find them, and to hunt them down."

Asked whether he wanted Mr. bin Laden dead, the president replied: "I want him - I want justice. And there's an old poster out West, as I recall, that said 'Wanted: Dead or Alive."

### Stocks drop at close of first day of regular trading

Stocks took a large hit today, even though the Federal Reserve cut interest rates in an effort to stabilize the market, as Wall Street opened for the first time since last Tuesday's ter-

Airline stocks were especially hard hit. All air travel across the United States was stalled for several days last week after hijackers slammed commercial jetliners into the World Trade Center and the Pentagon.

The Dow Jones industrial average plummeted 684.81 points, or 7.1 percent, to close at 8,920.70, its lowest level since December 1998. This was the biggest point loss ever for the Dow, although its percentage loss today was still smaller than its 22.6 percent focal point of how we traded through today. But that said, there is no brave new world here. We're still confronted with an economy that could see negative G.D.P. growth in the third and fourth quarter, but we have to work our way through that."

# FBI continues increase of their investigation

The FBI stepped up its search for possible collaborators in Tuesday's terrorist attacks, detaining 49 people for questioning and casting a global dragnet for as many as 200 others.

Attorney General John Ashcroft asked Congress to pass sweeping new anti-terrorism measures by week's end to assist the inquiry while assigning numerous federal agents to provide security aboard commercial air-

"Associates of the hijackers that have ties to terrorist organizations may be a continuing presence in the United States," the nation's top law enforcement officer warned.

# Violence prompts increased security measures

Last school year, gunshots were fired toward Corlett Hall, presumably from Amity Avenue. Less than a month ago, NNU security executed a campus-wide lock-down because of violent activity close to the school. These and other incidences lead may students to question the safety of the NNU community.

Darrel Stewart, head of NNU Security, asserted that the shooting last year was an isolated incident that had been listed as vandalism. The cause of the lock-down in August was also termed an isolated incident.

"There was an issue of some fighting that took place on the perimeter of our campus and some of the people supposedly fled through our campus. What a better place to hide than within our buildings with people

who look their own age," Steward related.

The goal of the lock-down was not to scare anyone, but for protection—to make sure that no one would be harmed. Stewart has been on security at NNU for two years and stated that last month's lock down was the second one since he has been here.

"The first time...was a year and a half ago. The Stinker station by Subway had been robbed by a man with a knife. He supposedly had fled, so we locked-down for safety," Stewart reported.

Nampa is the second-fastest growing city in the Treasure Valley and with that comes more violence, just as any city has. Should this concern the students and residents of NNU? Not as much as one might think.

Curtis Homer, Nampa's Assistant Chief of Police, stated that the area of Nampa that

NNU is situated in is not a high violence area. They get some calls of fights in the area, but for the most part, the area around NNU is relatively safe.

Patrol Sergeant Kyle Winnicki agreed and complimented NNU's Security Department. He said that Nampa Police rarely have to intervene in school related incidents.

Kirk Allen, who has been living across the street to the south of NNU for 10 years, related that he had known of problems in the past. Some of his neighbors were involved in drugs and gang activities, but they have been gone for three years now.

One woman about a block from campus related that there had been a drive-by shooting of the apartment next to her two years ago. "The people living there were of course evicted and it has been pretty quiet around here ever since," she

noted.

Many of the residents who live around the perimeter of the campus also said that they feel safe living in this area. Most say that they have never seen or heard any violence apart from domestic conflicts from time to time.

Violence can be menacing,

especially when it is so close to home. It is important to remember that NNU is not immune to the community around it. Safety is everyone's responsibility. For more information or to fill out an incident report, refer to the "security" section of NNU's website.

#### Recommended ways to stay safe:

- ~ Lock your doors, especially residents of Olson
- ~ Do not leave cash or other things of value lying out in the open
- ~ Lock vehicles and roll up all windows
- ~ Do not leave backpacks or other valuables visible in car
- ~ Do not walk alone at night
- ~ Go running during daytime
- ~ Invest in the \$12.99 bike lock

# Bandaging America's wounds with red, white, blue

The signs of the pain inflicted by the terrorists span New York, from the dust cloud over the southern tip of Manhattan to the faces of the missing tacked onto walls in Greenwich Village to the thousands who watch heartbreaking images of the World Trade Center hulk on giant television screens in Times Square.

But covering all that hurt, not only in New York but across the nation, are countless bandages in red, white and blue. In this city that is so often slow to show its feelings, the American flag bloomed in Manhattan and the boroughs, waved and worn by countless New Yorkers who wanted to do something, anything, to vent their anger and sorrow.

Tiny American flags fluttered from the radio antennas of taxis driven by men from Pakistan, Africa and Latin America. On the West Side Highway, a wall of people waved flags and cheered as rescue workers passed by. A bicyclist from Belgium, a florist from Korea, a Vietnam veteran from Puerto Rico, all flew the flag in Greenwich Village. Vendors hawked flags from Midtown sidewalks, patriotism at four bucks a pop.

"Just as the terrorists know that we are watching them, we know that they are watching us," said Moses Dávila, an unemployed teacher from Puerto Rico. "When they see us in the streets, wearing the flag, they

know that we are not afraid of them, and that we will defeat them."

That sense of patriotism, and defiance, blanketed America.

In Miami, where the protests of the government's handling of the custody battle over Elián González had included flag desecration (a tow-truck driver dragged the flag through the streets behind his truck), American flags blossomed from porches in Little Havana.

In California and the South, hardware and department stores sold out of flags. In the heartland, tiny flags fluttered like wildflowers in highway medians.

Mohammed Jaje, a cab driver from Pakistan who lives in Brooklyn, had one on his cab until someone took it on Friday night.

"I am not mad," Mr. Jaje said.
"Maybe someone needed it.
God bless America."

In Hammond, La., 60 miles northeast of New Orleans, Melissa Webb wore a T-shirt decorated with the flag on a shopping trip to the mall.

"We can't do anything to help them because we're down here," said Ms. Webb, 36, who works in a sporting goods store. At least, she said, she can fly the flag to show that her heart is with the rescue crews in New York.

Flag sightings were countless in the nation's capital, one of the biggest billowing from a staff lugged about the city by Joseph Doria, 82, a Filipino-American veteran of World War II.

"For years, I wave this flag in the streets and my neighbors think I'm crazy or a Communist," said Mr. Doria, who seemed in danger of toppling as he grasped a flag twice his size. "We divided and scattered after the war. But now, my friend, history repeats," he said of the terror attacks. "And we are learning America's heritage again."

Mr. Doria strutted off along the Mall, passing the Museum of American History where a woman pushing a stroller festooned with the Stars and Stripes entered an exhibit on the American presidency. A big banner proclaimed Harry S. Truman's observation: "Being president is like riding a tiger."

In Greenville, S.C., stores sold out of flags by the weekend. Home Depot and Wal-Mart did not have any left.

Around the city, thousands flapped in the wind, outside houses, on mailboxes, everywhere. It seemed that at least one in every three cars in Greenville had a flag on it, sometimes two.

Some did not have to shop for a flag. Bob Krause, a former marine, had flags that have been in the family for generations, flags that flew over old wars. Brock Sanders hung a 48-star American flag inherited from his grandfather who had flown it after Pearl Harbor was bombed.

On Peachtree Road in Atlanta, signs of patriotism marked almost every block—flags flying at half-staff in

Buckhead in front of Lenox Square and Phipps Plaza malls, at the Marta commuter train station. Expensive homes with neatly trimmed lawns have flags draped across the front door.

A red Cadillac with four large flags in each corner, its radio blaring "Stop, hey, what's that sound, everybody look what's going down," pulled out of Rocky's Italian Restaurant on Peachtree where a band was playing a "U.S.A. Jam" to raise money for the Red Cross. A woman walked out of a church on Peachtree wearing an antebellum-style Southern bonnet with red, white and blue ribbons.

Some telephone poles had homemade cardboard flags attached to them. Underneath one sign another one read "What's Next" in crude red lettering. Flags flew from high-rise buildings, apartments and construction sites. A sport utility vehicle was decorated with a homemade flag that looked as if it had been drawn by a child.

In one suburb, a house sported a freshly painted red, white and blue picket fence.

On a football weekend in the Deep South, cars that would normally have flown college flags now flew one, the same one.

In the heartland, the flag waved from the antennas of hot rods. In Brookville, Ohio, gasoline stations and the Holiday Inn pushed flags on two-foot sticks into their grounds. Hastily made paper flags appeared in windows of trailers and the homes

of the wealthy. Flags appeared on the tops of buildings that had never before worn one. In Rockford, Rochelle and Le Roy, Ill., the flag hung at half-staff and from poles in front of courthouse squares, schools, town halls and police stations.

"There is hope in that familiar sight," wrote Carin Chappelow, in a column for The Journal Review, a daily newspaper with a circulation of 10,000 in Crawfordsville, Ind. The Wal-Mart there ran out of flags on Wednesday.

At the start of a prayer service in front of the courthouse in Crawfordsville, Glen Long, a member of the local Veterans of Foreign Wars, clutched three small flags. "Five minutes ago I had 48," Mr. Long said.

Near Washington, in the well-to-do, normally sedate Chevy Chase Village, on the northwest edge of the capital, six flags appeared on one block of Grafton Street. John Klein, a retired federal worker, usu ally puts one up on holidays. Mr. Klein's flag was there again. But there was another on the home of Laurence Alvarado, an executive of an accounting firm, and another at the home of Peter Yeo, a Senate aide, and at the home of Anne Urban, a consultant. Another waved across the street, from the stoop of Emilie Downs and Clark Evans Downs, a partner in a law firm in Washington. "Because of what happened," said Julia Downs, one of the couple's two college-age daughters.
