Toby Rowland's "Glorious Windows"



The April Academy of Senior Professionals (ASP) luncheon speaker will be Toby Rowland, well-known Oklahoma sportscaster, SNU alumnus, and son of

Dr. Terry Rowland, Nazarene district superintendent in Oklahoma.

Toby is known as the "Voice of the Sooners." Toby's background includes serving as host for television shows on Sooner Sports TV as well as radio shows for Learfield Sports. Additionally, he is the play-by play announcer for OU football, men's basketball, and baseball.

Rowland worked as a sports anchor, reporter and producer at KWTV in Oklahoma City for 12 years. He is a two-time Emmy Award winner and has won the Oklahoma Association of Broadcasters Award for best sportscast, and the Society of Professional Journalists Award for Best Sports Reporting. Toby also became the host of the award-winning Friday Football Blitz high school football coverage. Rowland has also hosted the "T-Row in the Morning Show" on KREF Sports Talk 1400 for 13 years. His show is now syndicated statewide.

Toby got his start calling games as the play-by-play voice of Southern Nazarene University Crimson Storm basketball, football and baseball teams. He is a 1995 graduate of SNU,

Toby is married to his college sweetheart, Jennifer. They have three children; Trevor (18), Payton (16) and Chloe (9).



SNU Graduate Returns as President

On August 1, Dr. J. Keith Newman will be coming back home to his alma mater, Southern Nazarene University, to be its new president. Dr. Newman comes to SNU with experience as a police officer, a pastor of large Nazarene churches,



and as vice-president and chancellor of two Christian universities.

Newman, who earned a master's degree at SNU, was elected March 24 by the board of trustees to succeed Dr. Loren Gresham, who is retiring after 50 years at SNU as a faculty member, provost and finally president. Newman is coming to SNU from a position as CEO and Chancellor of Indiana Wesleyan University, the largest school in the Council of Christian Colleges and Universities. He has been at IWU for eight years. Prior to that, he spent seven years in Ohio as Mount Vernon Nazarene University's Vice-President of University Relations.

Although he pastored Nazarene churches in Arkansas, Texas and California for 17 years, Newman's first profession was that of an officer and homicide detective with the Houston Police Department. That is where he met another homicide detective, Carolyn, who later became his wife.

He holds a Doctorate of Education from Spalding University with a concentration in leadership. His doctoral dissertation examined the leadership qualities of Dr. J. B. Chapman, an educational leader in the Church of the Nazarene in the first half of the twentieth century.

Dr. Newman and his wife have two children, Andy and Alana. Andy is a graduate of Mount Vernon Nazarene University while Alana graduated from SNU.

"Culture and Christ"



Book Discussion By Barbara Culbertson


